From the Pastor's Desk

Why are Catholics required to attend Mass?

In 587 BC, the powerful Babylonian empire conquered Judah and people of Jerusalem were taken into exile. The city of Jerusalem and the great Temple were completely destroyed. The people who were taken in exile were forced to worship their God in a foreign land. The Psalmist says, "by the waters of Babylon, there we sat down and wept when we remembered Zion. On the

willows there we hung up our lyres. For there our captors required of us songs, and tormentors, mirth saying 'sing us one of the songs of Zion.' How shall we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land" (Ps 137). This captivity was formally ended in 538 BC when Persian Emperor, Cyrus the Great, gave Jews permission to return to Jerusalem. The prophet Ezekiel was one of the prophets who kept alive their hope of one day returning home. This was probably the time when Jews started Synagogues, where Sabbath and religious holydays were observed. The book of Ezra and Nehemiah reports what happened upon their arrival back in Judah.

The people who were returned and who were serious of their faith decided to rebuild their Temple so that they could resume their Temple worship again. They wept with joy at their restoration. Having been deprived so long of the freedom to worship God as he had instructed them, they had learned to treasure their sacred assemblies in the house of the Lord.

These ancient events illustrate why the Catholic Church requires attendance at mass on Sundays and certain holy days. Worship is the primary duty owed to God by his creatures, who receive from him not only their very existence, but every other good gift as well. Worship is also a privilege, a precious opportunity to encounter the great king of the universe who loves his people beyond all telling.

The ancient Jews who recognized this awesome duty and privilege made every effort to come to the temple to offer their sacrifices of grain and animals. How much more then should Catholics be eager to attend mass where the glorious sacrifice of the lamb of God himself is offered on the altar. (continued on p. 4)

Why are Catholics required to attend Mass? (Continued from p. 1)

Just as under the old covenant God required proper observance of the sabbath, under the new covenant the church requires proper observance of Sunday, 'the Lord's Day,' the day of resurrection. This is the first day of the week, a time for rest and worship.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that on Sunday and other holy days of obligation the faithful are to refrain from engaging in work or activities that hinder the worship owed to God, the joy proper to the Lord's Day, the performance of the works of mercy, and appropriate relaxation of mind and body. "Sunday is the day on which the paschal mystery is celebrated in light of the apostolic tradition and is to be observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal Church" (2177).

Great Are Those Who Teach and Obey the Commandments

Meditation: Why do people tend to view the "law of God" negatively rather than positively? Jesus' attitude towards the law of God can be summed up in the great prayer of Psalm 119: "Oh, how I love your law! It is my meditation all the day."

Reverence and respect

Jesus taught reverence and respect for God's law - reverence for God himself, reverence for the Lord's Day, reverence or respect for parents, respect for life, for property, for another person's good name, respect for oneself and for one's neighbor lest wrong or hurtful desires master and enslave us. Reverence and respect for God's commandments teach us the way of love - love of God and love of neighbor. What is impossible to humans is possible to God who gives generously of his gifts and the power of the Holy Spirit to those who put their faith and trust in him.

God gives us the grace, help, and strength to love as he loves, to forgive as he forgives, to think and judge as he judges, and to act as he acts with mercy, loving-kindness, and goodness. The Lord loves righteousness and hates wickedness. As his followers we must love his commandments and hate every form of sin and wrong-doing. If we want to live righteously as God desires for us, then we must know and understand the intention of God's commands for us, and decide in our heart to obey the Lord. Disaster Relief Collection for Turkey/Syria Earthquake Recovery Effort: Ash Wednesday

On February 6, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake devastated large areas of southern Turkey and northwest Syria. The death toll has surpassed 20,000 and continues to climb. Thousands of people have been injured and many are trapped beneath the rubble. The earthquake is the worst to strike Turkey this century. Within the subsequent 24 hours, the region experienced multiple aftershocks and a second 7.5 magnitude quake.

Across affected areas, apartment buildings and schools have been leveled. Telecommunications are disrupted, preventing families from identifying and accounting for missing loved ones. In Syria, displaced people are seeking shelter in schools and community centers in areas already devastated by years of war. Across southern Turkey, schools are closed, airport transportation is impaired and hospitals have been declared unusable.

Catholic Relief Services is supporting local partners in their efforts to provide urgent relief and assistance for long-term recovery. CRS has partnerships with Caritas Turkey and Caritas Syria, as well as other local partners. To support the efforts of these organizations, Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved a special collection to be held on **Ash Wednesday**, **February 22**, **2023**, **and for collection baskets to remain available for the collection through the first Sunday of Lent.** Bishop Brennan appreciates your generosity this past summer to those affected by the severe storms and flooding in Eastern Kentucky and Southern West Virginia. But he feels impelled once again to ask you to do what you can to help those affected by this most recent disaster.

All funds collected in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will be given to Catholic Relief Services with the special designation for use in the Turkey/Syria Earthquake Recovery Effort.
