

From the Pastor's Desk

Divorce vs Annulment??

As you all know Catholic church uses the term "annulment" rather than "divorce." Why? And what is the difference between divorce and annulment?

Divorce literally means dissolve, separate, or divide something from something else. Legally, it means dissolving or separating a marital union. Through a legal process, a court or some other legal body declares that the marriage in question is dissolved or separated.

According to the Catholic view, no human power on earth has the authority to dissolve a marriage which was united by God. Jesus said, "They are no more two but one. What God has united let no man put asunder" (Mt 19). So, the Catholic church believes that a marriage is to be held valid until it is proved otherwise. Annulment is a legal process by the Ecclesiastical Tribunal that declares a marriage in question null and void as if it never happened. Annulment applies to marriage in question when an impediment, lack of form or defect of consent proved. Marriage annulment enables you to declare that the wedding did not take place.

Now you may wonder, how can a court or tribunal declare that this marriage has never taken place since we all witnessed the wedding ceremony? Yes, it is true that the wedding in question took place in a church and there are witnesses to this wedding, but the above mentioned reasons make that marriage null and void. That is, there was no marriage at all in the eyes of the law. The Court declared a marriage null and void through a legal process known as annulment process.

Since marriage is a sacrament, the Catholic Church claims that it has authority to see whether the marriage in question is valid or invalid. Marriage Tribunals are constituted at the diocesan level following the procedure given in Canon law to declare a marriage valid or invalid. For the Church, all marriages are valid unless and until proved otherwise.

The AMS does not receive any funding from the government or military, and has no parishes from which to receive a weekly assessment. Eucharistic Reflection: December 3, 2023

On December 3, 2023, Daniel Maul, Director of the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis for the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, will be here to give a brief reflection on the Eucharist after each Sunday morning Mass. The purpose of this gathering is to reflect upon the Eucharistic nature of our faith and our Church, so as to deepen our understanding of it and strengthen our ability to live it. Drawing on key insights found in the writings of Bishop Robert Barron, Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger (Pope Benedict XVI), and University of Notre Dame theology professor Timothy P. O'Malley, the presenter will explore Catholic beliefs about the Eucharist, especially along the themes of Eucharist as Sacred Meal, Sacrifice, and Real Presence. We will also explore what it means to become a Eucharistic people. How must we live the Eucharist, not only believe in it and receive it? After we examine the nature of the Love that we receive in the Eucharist. Through prayer, presentation, silent reflection, and personal sharing, attendees will have the opportunity to draw closer to the Eucharistic Lord and to one another.

Daniel Maul hails from South Holland, Illinois, a southern suburb of Chicago. In the winter of 2020, he moved from Indiana with his wife (Amanda) and two small children (Daniela and Abram). He is the Director of the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis. Daniel has a Bachelor's degree in Religious Studies and Philosophy from Saint Norbert College, and a Master's degree in Theology from Catholic Theological Union, in Chicago. He did years of doctoral work in Theology at Loyola University Chicago, before finally giving up and ending as an ABD. He's been a parish youth minister, a DRE, a high school theology teacher, and a part-time, adjunct, theology professor.

Whoever Humbles Oneself Will Be Exalted

Meditation: Who doesn't desire the praise and respect of others? We want others to see us at our best with all of our strengths and achievements - rather than at our worst with all of our faults and shortcomings. God sees us as we truly are - sinners and beggars always in need of his mercy, help, and guidance.

True humility

Respect for God and for his ways inclines us to humility and to simplicity of heart - the willing readiness to seek the one true good who is God himself. What is the nature of true humility and why should we embrace it as essential for our lives? We can easily mistake humility as something demeaning or harmful to our sense of well-being and feeling good about ourselves. True humility is not feeling bad about yourself, or having a low opinion of yourself, or thinking of yourself as inferior to all others. True humility frees us from preoccupation with ourselves, whereas a low self-opinion tends to focus our attention on ourselves. Humility is truth in self-understanding and truth in action. Viewing ourselves honestly, with sober judgment, means seeing ourselves the way God sees us (Psalm 139:1-4).

A humble person makes a realistic assessment of oneself without illusion or pretense to be something one is not. A truly humble person regards oneself neither smaller nor larger than one truly is. True humility frees us to be ourselves as God regards us and to avoid falling into despair and pride. A humble person does not want to wear a mask or put on a facade in order to look good to others. Such a person is not swayed by accidentals, such as fame, reputation, success, or failure.
